First Holy Communion & Confirmation 2023: It is time to register for these 2 sacraments. The catechism classes will start in September. To be eligible for **First Communion**, the child must be **7 years by the 31st of August**. For **Confirmation**, the candidate must be **13 years by the 31st of August**.

RCIA Adults who wish to convert fully to the Catholic faith should also register for **Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)** to be received at Easter. We work with Adults in an Adult way to achieve the sacraments that will question, enhance and renew your faith & commitment to God. The lessons will also start in September. *Please pick up all registration forms from the Parish Office.*

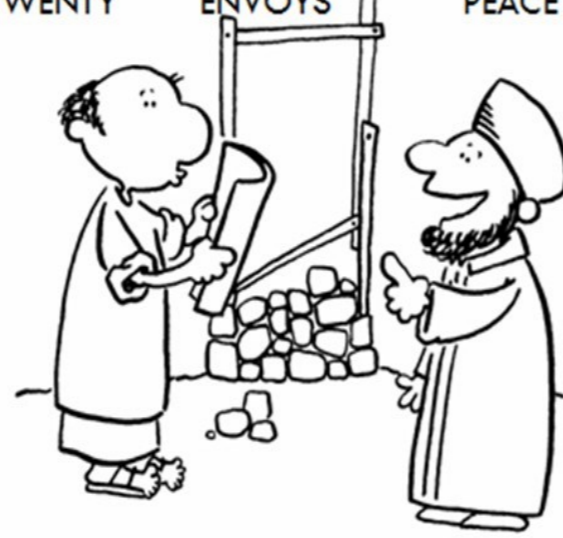

REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL

The Cost of Discipleship

Dear friends in Christ, this Sunday, the twenty-third Sunday of the Church's liturgical year C, we are invited to reflect on **'The Cost of Discipleship.'** Allegiance to Christ means putting Him first in our lives. For the evangelist the writer of today's gospel (**Luke 14:25-33**), being a disciple and taking up the cross are practically synonymous. The cross is not something we need to go looking for, neither is it to be found in self-imposed penances. Fidelity to the call of Jesus and striving to live as a disciple will bring their own crosses. The temptation to cheap grace is to settle down to a comfortable Christianity where there are no challenges, no calls for self-denial or the cross. Jesus did not want to deceive anybody about the difficulty of being His disciple. In the gospel He sets down three conditions. If one wants to be His disciple, **one must break away from ('hate') one's family, one's goods and even one's own life.** These demands are unacceptable to those who think in human terms. They can be understood and accepted only by those who have been granted "wisdom from above," as we read in today's first reading (Wisdom 9:13-18). The letter to Philemon (**Philemon 9: 10, 12-17**) is a beautiful example of **love in practice, of forgiveness, and detachment from material goods.** It is a powerful example of the challenge to costly grace. Onesimus was a runaway slave who has become a Christian in Rome. St. Paul sends him back to his former owner Philemon, with a letter requesting him to receive Onesimus no longer as a slave but as a brother in the Lord. St. Paul's argument was basically simple: **you have experienced the grace of the Lord, now be gracious in turn [in return].** What was Philemon to do? Pardon Onesimus and give him freedom? If he did so, would not the other slaves become Christians and claim freedom and even brotherhood? To serve God and to follow the directives of St. Paul, Philemon would have to make a brother of one who was, in the eyes of society, debased below comradeship. It could even mean incurring economic loss and social ostracism. This is the cost of discipleship. Brothers and Sisters in Christ, today let us remember that we profess faith in God who gave all that was dearest to Him when He gave us His only Son. Our redemption did not come cheaply. It came at the price of the blood of the Son of God who loved us and delivered himself for us.

TODAY'S READINGS

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

You are just, O Lord, and your judgement is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love.

OPENING PRAYER

O God, by whom we are redeemed and receive adoption, look graciously upon your beloved sons and daughters, that those who believe in Christ may receive true freedom and an everlasting inheritance. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

FIRST READING (Wisdom 9:13-18)

What man can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Ps 89)

R. O Lord, you have been our refuge from one generation to the next.

You turn men back into dust and say: 'Go back, sons of men.' To your eyes a thousand years are like yesterday, come and gone, no more than a watch in the night.

You sweep men away like a dream, like grass which springs up in the morning. In the morning it springs up and flowers: by evening it withers and fades.

Make us know the shortness of our life that we may gain wisdom of heart. Lord, relent! Is your anger for ever? Show pity to your servants.

In the morning, fill us with your love; we shall exult and rejoice all our days. Let the favour of the Lord be upon us: give success to the work of our hands.

SECOND READING (Philemon 9-10.12-17)

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him - I could say - a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

I call you friends, says the Lord, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father.

GOSPEL (Luke 14:25-33)

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'
