The Season of Lent

- Ash Wednesday: Option to celebrate at home**
 Given the pandemic, the church has provided a format for celebrating the Ash Wednesday at home so as to decongest the church service. Families are especially encouraged to use this format whereby members can sign one another with the ash. Find the format in the leaflet enclosed in the bulletin.
- Masses:** For those who must come to the Church for Ash Wednesday service, we shall have only the 9.30am and 7pm Masses. We encourage younger parishioners to please come for the 7pm Mass so as to decongest the 9.30am Mass. We shall be signed with ashes using swab cotton buds
- Obligation of fasting and abstinence:** Catholics are obliged to observe the laws of **fasting and abstinence** on Ash Wednesday. Fasting means the eating of only one main meal with two smaller ones permitted, and applies to all who have reached their 18th birthday until they reach their 60th year. Abstinence means abstaining from meat and applies to all who have reached their 14th birthday with no upper age limit. Please remember to observe these obligations on Wednesday.
- Stations of the Cross** will be held every Friday of Lent at 9.30am followed by Mass at 10am. Stations of the Cross in the evening at 7pm will be online (via Zoom/Facebook). This will be followed by Mass.

Live-streamed Masses via ZOOM/Facebook on Weekdays: Beginning Thursday after Ash Wednesday, we shall experiment having online Mass at 7pm on weekdays (Monday – Friday). This is in addition to the daily Masses in the Church at 9.30am. We want to provide more opportunities for spiritual nourishment at

this time. The online Masses will be quiet and prayerful. However, sustaining it will depend on attendance – the number that connects.

REFLECTIONS ON THE GOSPEL

Pastoral Letter for the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time on Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning a Lent, a time for turning again to the practice of our faith, in prayer, self-denial (fasting) and practical generosity (almsgiving). It is the doorway into this season of renewal. As we cross this threshold we customarily receive ashes on our foreheads, in the sign of the cross. This is a public mark of our turning again to God, seeking his mercy, forgiveness and help. We use these words: 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return'. Yes, we cannot pretend otherwise. Or: 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel'. Yes, we seek the one thing that is absolutely necessary: the grace of God. Some churches will of course be open for the celebration of Mass as usual but we must all be very careful about travelling too far. We must be so careful and cooperative in the measures we must take, to protect ourselves and to protect others. Receiving ashes is an outward sign of an inner step, a movement of the heart towards our beloved Lord. This year I invite you to concentrate much more on this inner, spiritual movement than on its outward manifestation in the imposition of ashes. My suggestion is this: celebrate Ash Wednesday at home, with your family, in the household or 'support bubble' of which you are a part. Gather for a while. Read the prayer which I offer (find these in the leaflet inserted into the bulletin). Bless each other by making the sign of the cross on each other's forehead. Spent some time praying in a way that you know. But please, make this a prayer of your heart for God's mercy upon this world struggling to cope with the terrible pandemic and the devastation it is bringing. Please do not hesitate, within your household or 'bubble', to bless each other on this Ash Wednesday. We do well to remember together our need of the good Lord. Together, and through each other, he wants to comfort and reassure us of his loving presence. If, on this day, we set aside every pretence that we can do everything of ourselves, then we create in our hearts and lives the space for God's grace and strength to find a home in us. This is the great invitation of Ash Wednesday and of the weeks of Lent which follow. Please do take up this invitation. Open your hearts to the gift of God's presence to support, comfort and strengthen you. This year, it may be best to do this, not by going to church, but by sharing the prayer, the blessing and this moment of dedication within the love of your family and friends. Please do include me in your prayers, too. May God bless you all,

TODAY'S READINGS

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

Be my protector, O God, a mighty stronghold to save me. For you are my rock, my stronghold! Lead me, guide me, for the sake of your name.

FIRST READING Leviticus 13:1-2.44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons. 'The man is leprosy: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart: he must live outside the camp.'

Take me for your model, as I take Christ.

GOSPEL Mark 1:40-45



FEAST OF THE WEEK



Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday marking the beginning of the Season of Lent, takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday and is a season of fasting and prayer, chiefly observed by Catholics, although many other Christians observe it too. The ashes are made from blessed palm branches, taken from the previous year's Palm Sunday Mass. The distribution of ashes comes from an ancient ceremony, when Christians who had committed grave faults performed public penance. On Ash Wednesday, the Bishop blessed the hair shirts which they were to wear during the forty days of penance, and sprinkled over them ashes made from the palms from the previous year. Then, while the faithful recited the Seven Penitential Psalms, the penitents were turned out of the church because of their sins -- just as Adam, the first man, was turned out of Paradise because of his disobedience. The penitents did not enter the church again until Maundy Thursday after having won reconciliation by the toil of forty days' penance and sacramental absolution. Later, all Christians, whether public or secret penitents, came to receive ashes out of devotion. In earlier times, the distribution of ashes was followed by a penitential procession.
